COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This introductory language and culture course allows students to acquire the basic elements of spoken and written French. They learn how to express themselves in everyday life situations. In class work will be supplemented by multimedia activities and real-life situations in the city of Paris.

COURSE STRUCTURE:

This team taught course is divided into two parts: three meetings per week with the instructor and one meeting per week with the teaching assistant.

ASSESSMENT AND GRADING:

Students must be present for the exam.

A grade of C or above is required to be admitted in the upper level.

There will be no make-up exams unless the absence can be justified (see excused absences above)
