Course Description

This introductory language and culture course allows students to acquire the basic elements of spoken and written French. They learn how to express themselves in everyday life situations. In class work will be supplemented by multimedia activities and real-life situations in the city of Paris.

Learn to understand and use familiar everyday expressions and basic phrases. Introduce yourself and others. Ask and answer questions about yourself and have simple conversations such as where you live, people you know, and things you possess. Learn to interact with others at a beginner level.

An instructor may recommend that a student withdraw, if absences have made it impossible to continue in the course at a satisfactory level.
