Course Description

The objective of the course is to provide students with insights on econometric analysis. It introduces students to regression methods for analysing data in different context. Topics covered include simple and multiple regression analysis with cross-sectional data.

The emphasis of the course is also on empirical applications. We will use the statistical software STATA, which is used by a large number of companies, government agencies, international organisations, and research centres. Statistical programming skills are a large contributor to the wage premium which economics major receive.
